CHAPTER 1

General Rules of Reciting The Holy Qur'an

We should be aware of the general etiquette of reciting the Holy Qur'an. The main points to consider are:

- a) The Holy Book should be handled with respect and humility. It should not be treated like any other book.
- b) The reciter of the Qur'an must be in ablution (wudhoo) in order to touch the letters of the Holy Qur'an. In fact, it is forbidden (haraam) to touch any word without ablution (wudhoo).
- c) It is recommended for the reciter to face the Holy Ka'bah and the head to be covered.
- d) When the Qur'an is being recited, silence must be maintained. The Prophet (s.a.w.) has said: "Seventy years of Amaals are lost if one talks of **worldly** affairs during the recitation of the Holy Qur'an."
- e) Our aim must be to learn from the Qur'an the lessons which will help and guide our lives. Qur'an has to be recited, understood and implemented into our daily lives.


Au'dhubillah

It is emphasised that we start the recitation of the Holy Qur'an with Au'dhubillah followed by Bismillah.

"I seek refuge from the devil (Shaitan), the accursed".

Bismillah

The recitation of the verses and/or surah should start with Bismillah as below:



"In the name of Allah, the Beneficent, the Merciful".

However, it is prohibited to begin Surah At Tauba with Bismillah. This is the only Surah in which you should not begin with Bismillah.

In Islam we are recommended to start all our work with Bismillah. God willing, our work should turn out for the best.

When we have completed reciting the Qur'an we should say:-



"Allah (S.W.T), the Greatest, has spoken the truth."






CHAPTER 2

Dots (Nugat)

As the Arabic alphabet contains many dots (nuqat), it is recommended that one becomes familiar with the number and position of dots. The dots (nuqat) differentiate the letters.

Dots should be introduced on a straight line as below. Arabic Language is written from right to left (the opposite way to the English language).


The recognition of dots will enable the students to understand the letters at a later stage.




In should be noted that in the Arabic Alphabet three dots never occurs under the letter.

The teachers should encourage the student to play and recognise the dots as in worksheet 1 to 5.



CHAPTER 3

The Alphabet (Huroof)


As in any other language, the Arabic alphabet also has specific names for the letters.

It is important to introduce the names of the alphabet as this allows the students to know the name and will later help them to recite the Huroof-e-Muqatta'at. There are 29 Surahs out of 114 which begin with Huroof-e-Muqatta'at.



In order to make students visualise the alphabet properly, teachers may introduce the alphabet in small sets depending on the ability of the students.

Emphasis must be placed on correct pronunciation (makharij) of the alphabet.





CHAPTER 4

Sound

The next stage is to have a few sessions on sound practice i.e. the phonetic system. It is important that students are given enough practice.

An attempt has been made to differentiate between letters of similar sound of Arabic.

Joining the Letters


When joining letters to form words, the shapes of the alphabets undergo some changes. We can group these into three:


1. Shrinking letters : There are seven letters and the letter 'shrinks' when joining






2. Tail-less letters: There are nine letters in this group. The letters get 'shortened' by their 'tail' being cut when joining.





3. Unique letters: There are six letters in this group. These letters **cannot** undergo any changes. They cannot be joined to the next letter but a previous letter can join it.

CHAPTER 7

The Sukoon

One often notices a smaller semicircular sign on the top of letters as seen below:



It should be noted that such signed letters are always preceded by a letter with a vowel and they cannot be pronounced on their own. When sukoon letters are joined to previous letters with a vowel, they are pronounced very lightly or with a half sound,

e.g



The sign is called the sukoon but the letter with the sukoon sign - is referred to as "sakin".



The letter with the sukoon sign is called a sakin letter.



The sign itself is called the sukoon.
