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CHAPTER 1

Revision

In this chapter, we will summarise what we have learnt in Part 1 of the book. It is important that the lessons of Part 1 are understood well, before we look at the lessons in this book.

- **(1) Wudhoo:** should be done before reciting any part of the Holy Qur'an. It is better to face the Qibla (Kaaba) when reciting the Holy Qur'an.
- (2) The recitation of the Holy Qur'an must begin with the saying of:

"I seek refuge from the devil (Shaitan), the accursed".

"In the name of Allah, the Beneficent, the Merciful".

- **(3) Introduction to dots:** the recognition of letters by the number and position of dots; one or two dots at the top or bottom of a letter. For example, letter "Ba" has one dot at the bottom.
- **(4) Alphabet:** here we looked at the naming and writing of the alphabet. It should be remembered that Arabic writing (and reading) is from right to left (whereas English language is read and written from left to right).

Please see the alphabets as a reference on page 11.

- **(5) Sound of Alphabet:** correct pronounciation (makhaarij) of the alphabet is very important, as a wrong pronounciation can have a different meaning.
- (6) It is very important that before you go any further, you are able to name all the alphabet; you should also be able to correctly pronounce the alphabet. Do not rush to the next lessons if you are still unable to name and correctly pronounce the alphabet; spend as much time as you need to do this correctly.

- (7) **Joining the letters:** remember that the same letter may be written in a different form, and these you must be able to recognise. Remember that in some cases, the position of the dot(s) on the letter itself will identify the particular letter. For the moment, you are not expected to be able to write the different forms of the same letter.
- **(8) The Sukoon sign:** the Sukoon sign is used to produce a half sound and therefore changing the pronounciation of a letter.

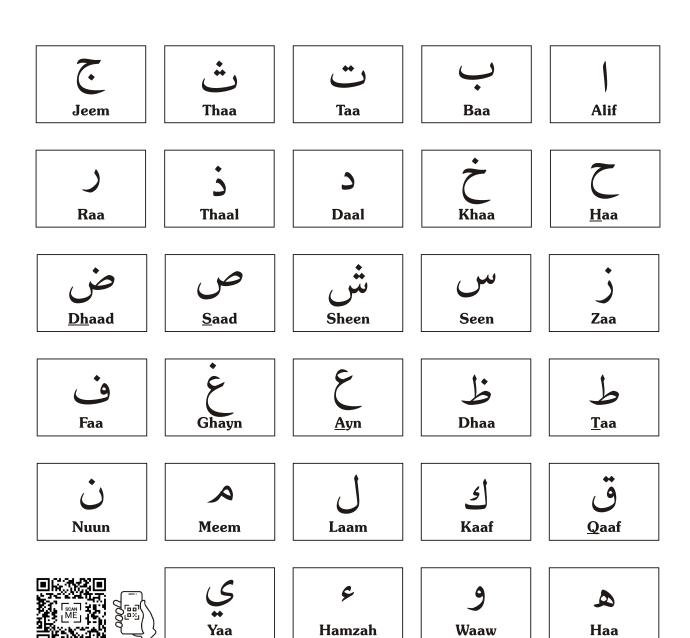
You are reminded that there are certain letters which do not join the previous letter; these are called as "Unique Letters".

CHAPTER 2

Long Vowels / Madd letters / Huroof Madd

If there is a letter with a sign of Fathah, Kasrah or Dhammah we pronounce it as follows:



These sounds are called Short Vowel Sounds (1 Stretch).

For example:

Therefore, to have a long vowel sound (2 Stretches) from a Fathah letter, we add Alif. The letter Alif is known as Alif Madd.

But what happens when the letter has a Kasrah?

To have a long vowel sound (2 Stretches) from Kasrah letter, we add Yaa Sukoon (Yaa Madd)

For example:

LONG VOWEL = YAA Sukoon + LETTER WITH KASRAH (Short Vowel)

And when there is a Dhammah letter, we need to add Waaw 9 Sukoon (Waaw Madd) to make it into a long vowel sound:

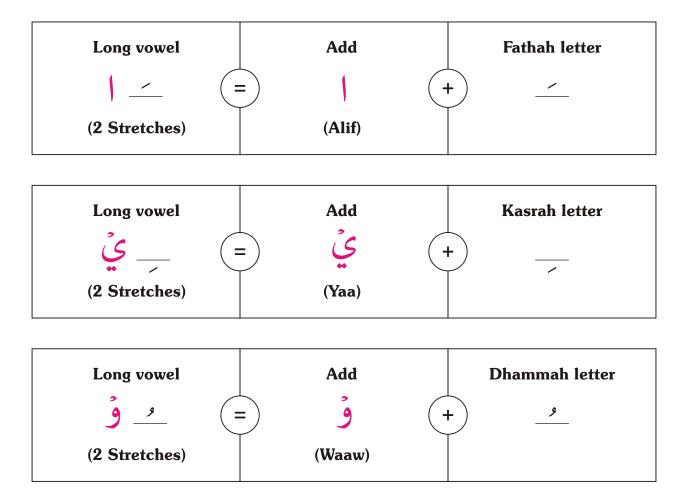
LONG VOWEL = WAAW Sukoon + LETTER WITH DHAMMAH (Short Vowel)

The letters get are also called THE MADD LETTERS - Huroof al Madd

NOTE: The Uthmani Text does not have the Sukoon sign ____ on the Madd letters

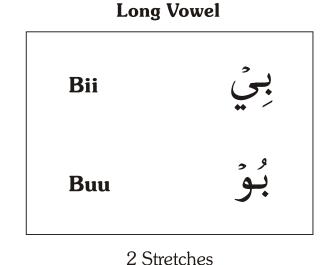
Leen letters are read softly and smoothly. There are two Leen letters. These are Waaw (${\cal G}$) and Yaa (${\cal G}$)

The rule of Leen is, a letter must have a Fathah followed by Waaw Sukoon or Yaa Sukoon, then that letter is pronounced softly.

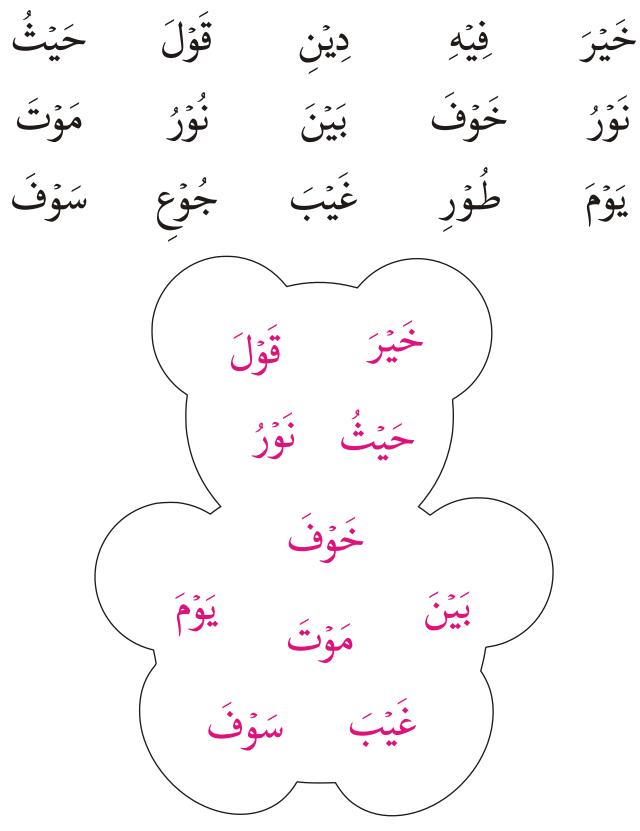

CHAPTER 4

Another kind of Long Vowels

There is another way of writing a long vowel. In chapter 2, we saw that long vowel (2 Stretches) is produced by the addition of Alif, Yaa Sukoon or Waaw Sukoon.

The other way of writing a long vowel is to use the standing Fathah, standing Kasrah and inverted (upside down) Dhammah. The sounds produced are exactly the same, but just written differently.

These signs are:

Remember: The long vowels have 2 stretches.

For example:

Worksheets 1-5 will give you practise in making clear the formation of long vowels, from short vowels, by the addition of Alif (to Fathah letters), Yaa Sukoon (to Kasrah letters) and Waaw Sukoon (to Dhammah letters).

Note: Attention must be paid to the correct pronounciation of letters when reciting the Holy Qur'an. An incorrect pronounciation can change the meaning.

When practising to read the Holy Qur'an, you should know absolutely clearly the difference between Short and Long vowel sounds.

WORDS WHICH MAY CAUSE CONFUSION

By now you should be thoroughly confident in the recognition of long vowels, i.e.:

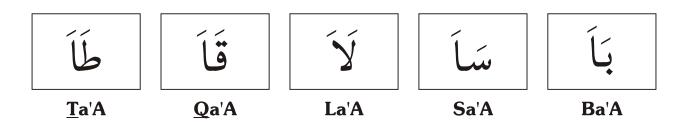

With Kasrah letter - is added

With Dhammah letter - is added

Another example which usually causes confusion is the joining of a Fathah letter with an Alif which has a sign. The difference here is that the Alif has a sign. In this case then, the Alif is no longer a long vowel, and has to be pronounced.

Signs of Tanween

The Tanween signs are as follows:

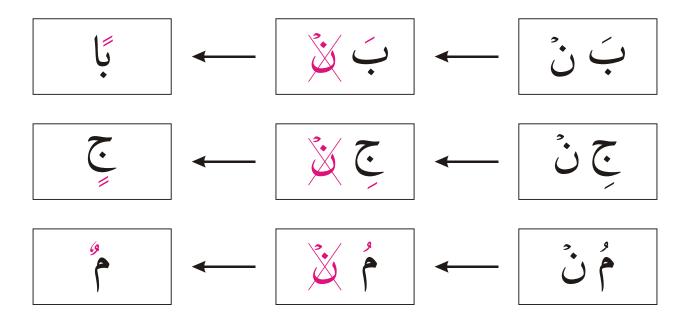


The Tanween sign is in fact a double Fathah, double Kasrah or double Dhammah. The Tanween sign is also called a nunation sign because all the letters with Tanween will end with a Nuun sound.

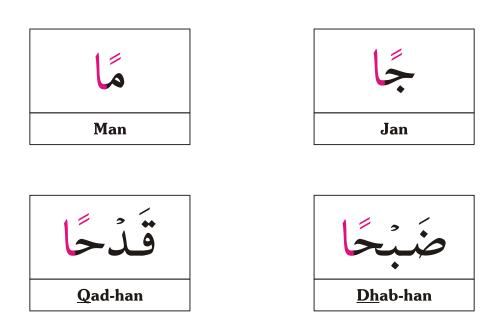
For example, the following words end with a Nuun sound:



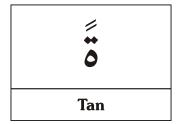
Now the above words can be written in a short form using the Tanween sign. We cancel the letter, and use the Tanween sign.



When a letter carries a Fathah Tanween ($_=$), it is usually followed by an Alif (\)). It is important to note that Alif is not pronounced.

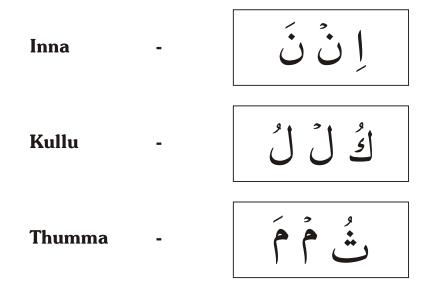
Shaddah Sign

The Shaddah sign is as follows:

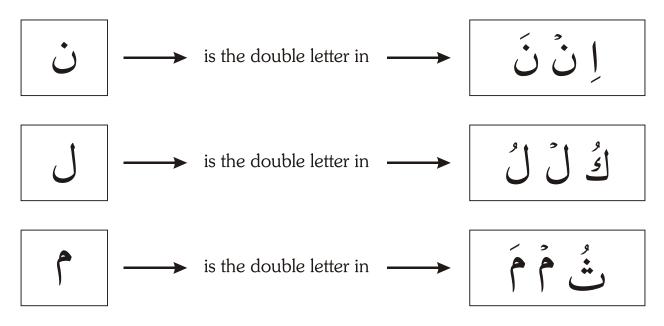


In English, an emphasis sound is made by using a double letter, eg. bu<u>tt</u>er, i<u>nn</u>ocent. In Arabic, we do not use double letters; instead we use the Shaddah sign.

In full form, the following sounds are produced by the letters:



In the above words, the double letters are:



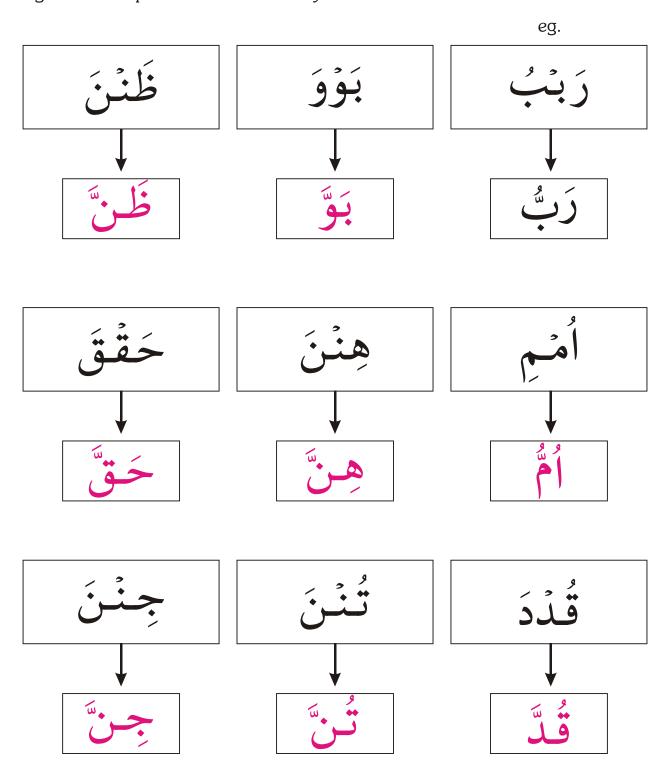
Instead of writing these double letters we cancel the letter with Sukoon and add a **SHADDAH** sign on the other letter.

Note: The first of the double letter will always be a Sukoon.

Rules of Meem (") & Nuun (") Shaddah

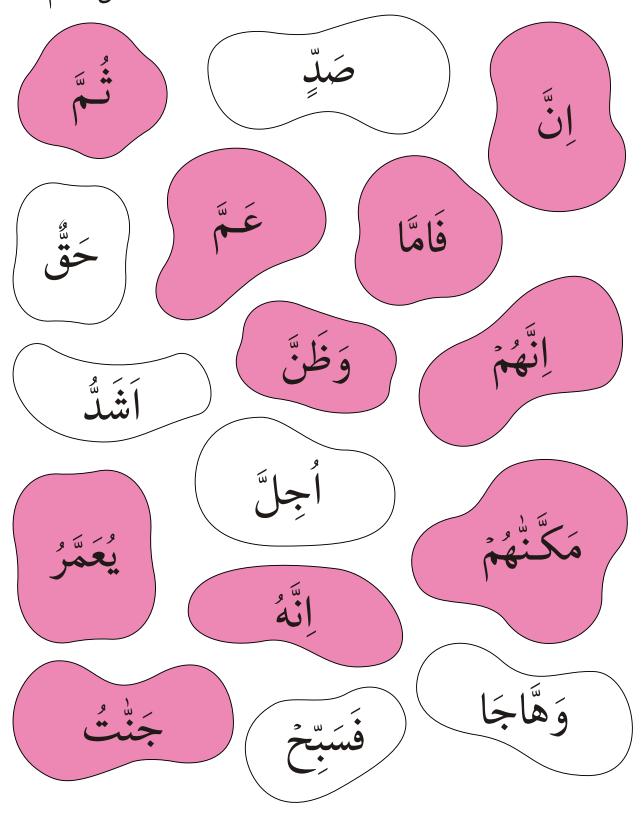

CHAPTER 9

Isti'laa Letters

Isti'laa describes the characteristic of a letter. It means the elevation. Isti'laa letters are pronounced with a heavy sound (raising the tongue) within the mouth.

There are 7 letters of Isti'laa:

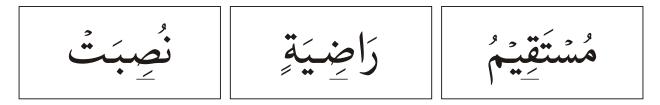

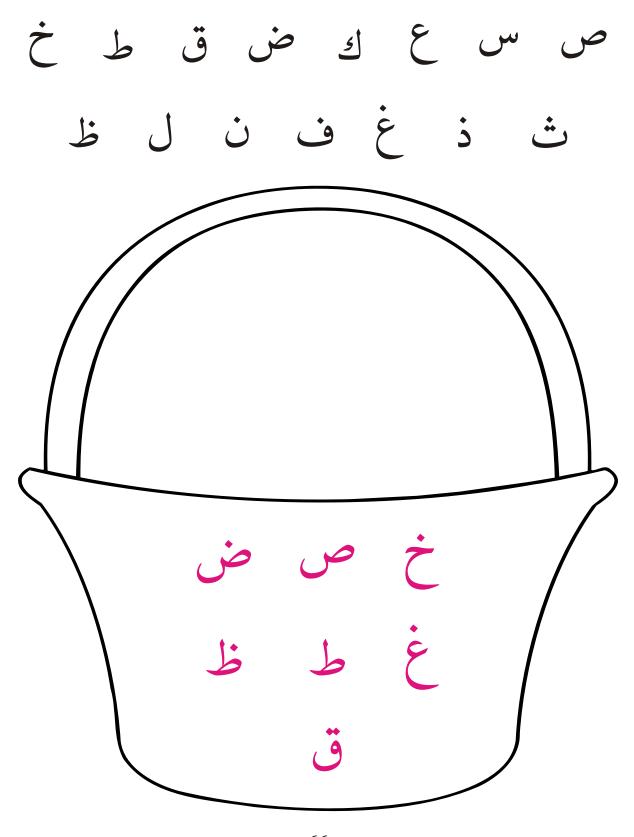

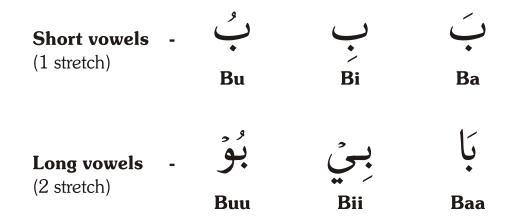

CHAPTER 10

Maddah - The Stretch

Maddah means to stretch. In the previous lessons, we have learnt about short and long vowels.

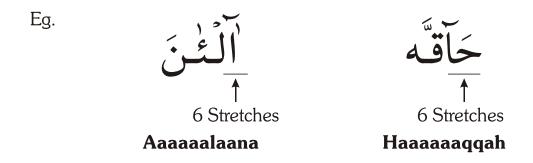


Now, there are two more **Longer** vowels to learn about.

1) Long vowel followed by Hamzah / Alif (4 stretch Maddah).



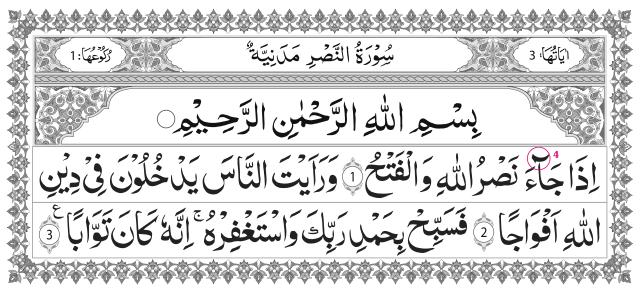
2) Long vowel followed by a Sukoon or a Shaddah (6 stretch Maddah).



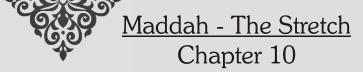
Note:

In the IndoPak script, you will come across both the lighter (\sim) and dark Maddah (\sim). The lighter Maddah (\sim) will always be 4 stretches whilst the darker Maddah (\sim) can be 4 or 6 stretches.

CHAPTER 11

Huroof Muqatta'at

Muqatta'at means Abbreviated or Shortened. These letters appear 29 times in the beginning of different chapters of the Qur'an. Some of the letters repeat and are same. They are written either as a single letter or up to five letters together like a word. They are pronounced individually by their **Names** rather than their sounds. Their meaning remains unknown.

CHAPTER 12

Silent Letters

Silent letters are letters within a word which:

Rule 1:

Do not have any sign (Harakah) and will be followed by a letter with a **Sukoon** or **Shaddah**. These letters are \mathfrak{E} . Therefore they will not be pronounced.

Note: Sometimes there are two letters without a sign followed by **Sukoon** or **Shaddah.** In this case both letters are silent and not pronounced.

For example:

Alif ()) is silent letter and is read as WAL ())

وَالَ

Alif () is silent letter and is read as FAD (فُكُ)

فَادُ

Alif (ا) is silent letter and is read as WALLA (وَالَ)

وَالَّ

Alif () and Waw () are silent is read as DHUL ($\dot{\hat{c}}$)



Rule 2:

Do not have any signs (Harakah) and is preceded with a long vowel Fathah ($\frac{1}{2}$)

For example:

Yaa (ي) is silent letter and is read as FAHADAA (فَهَدَا)



Waaw () and Alif () are silent and is read as

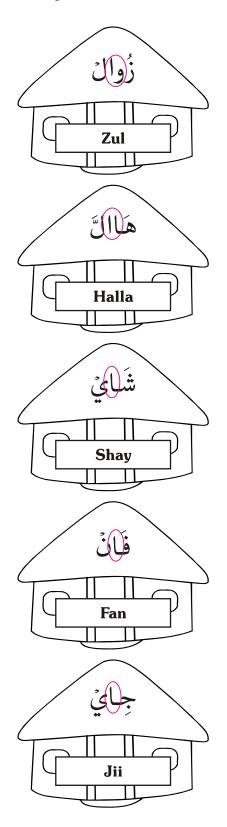


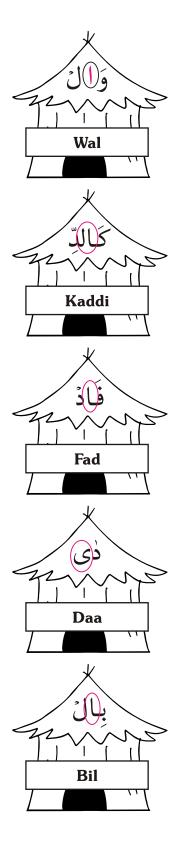

CHAPTER 13

Punctuation

When reciting the Holy Qur'an, we often come across Punctuation signs. Each of these signs has it's own meaning and it is important that we observe these when reading the Qur'an.

1. **Key Punctuation**: These have to be followed or the meaning of the verse will change.

End of Sentence - Full Stop - O

Waqf Laazim - Must Stop - 🔎

Pause (Like a comma in English) - b

Must Not Stop - >

2. Unlike the Key Punctuation, the meaning of the verse will NOT change if not observed.

Better to Stop Better to Continue

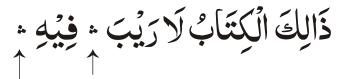

3. Others

Stop at one of the verses only & &

(Surah Baqrah, Verse 2)



If you stop here, then you must continue here, or vice versa.

Slight pause without breathing

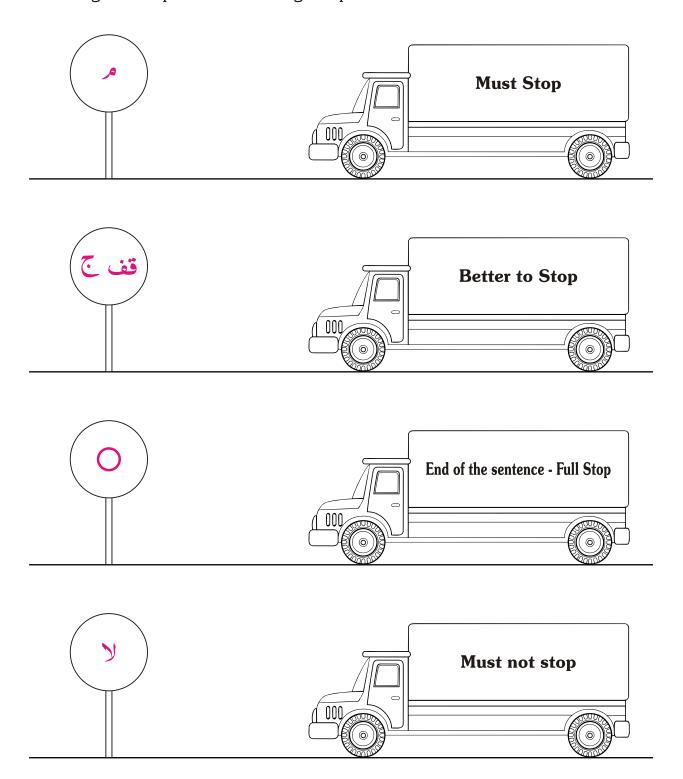

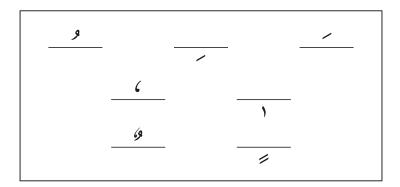

Rules of Stopping

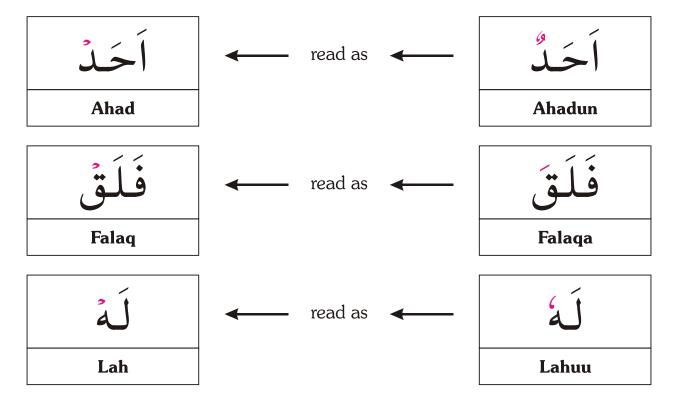
Now that we know the punctuation signs, we know where to stop, pause or continue when reciting the Holy Qur'an.

Rule 1:

Whenever we come to a punctuation sign while reading the Holy Qur'an, if the end letter has any of the following signs below, then the letter changes to a Sukoon sound.



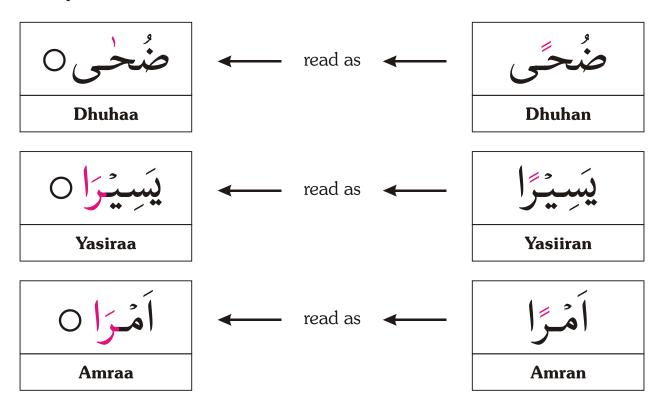
For example:



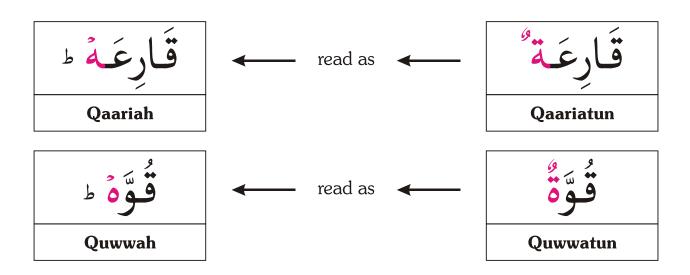
Rule 2:

When stopping on any word with Fathah Tanween ($\stackrel{/}{-}$), then the Tanween will change into Alif Madd ($\stackrel{1}{-}$ Long vowel - 2 stretches)

Examples:



If the last letter before stopping is Ta-marbutah ($\overset{\bullet}{\circ}$) then it is pronounced as Ha ($\overset{\bullet}{\circ}$). For example:

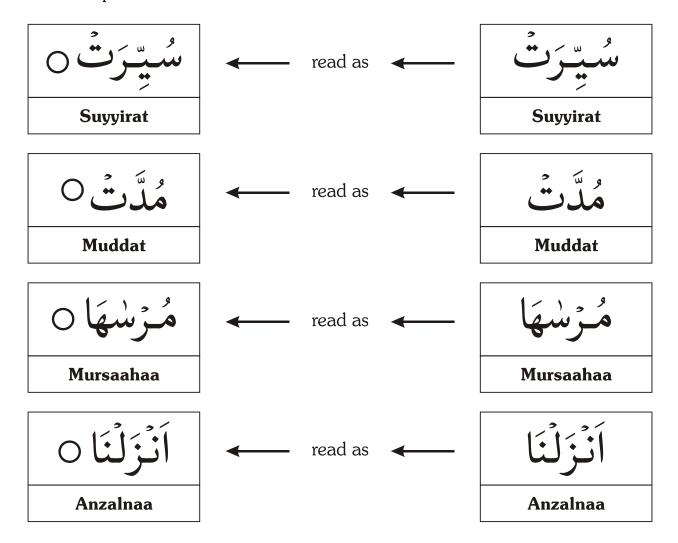


Remember that Ta-marbutah ($\ddot{\delta}$) will be pronounced as Ta ($\ddot{\delta}$) in the normal way when no pause is made.

Rule 3: Unchanged

Words ending with Sukoon (<u></u>) or the Fathah long vowel, the sound of the last letter remains **unchanged**.

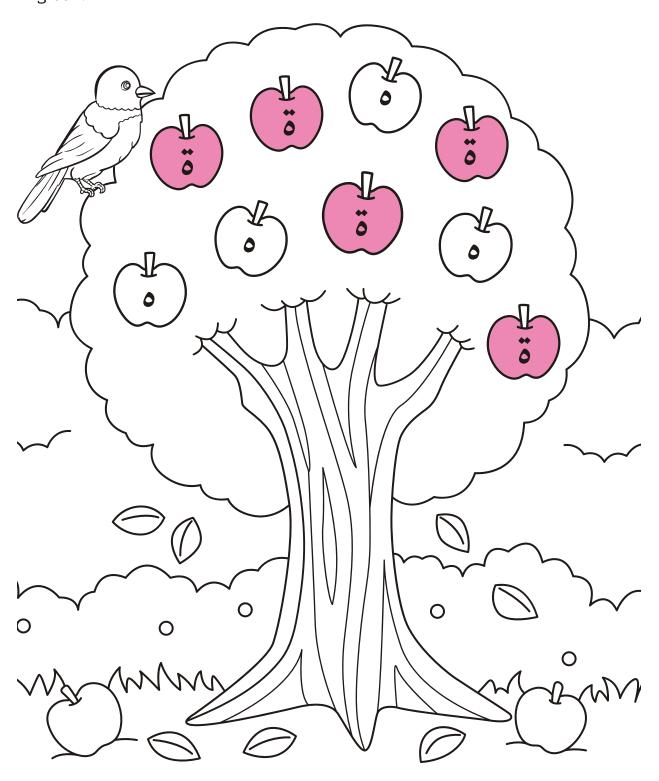

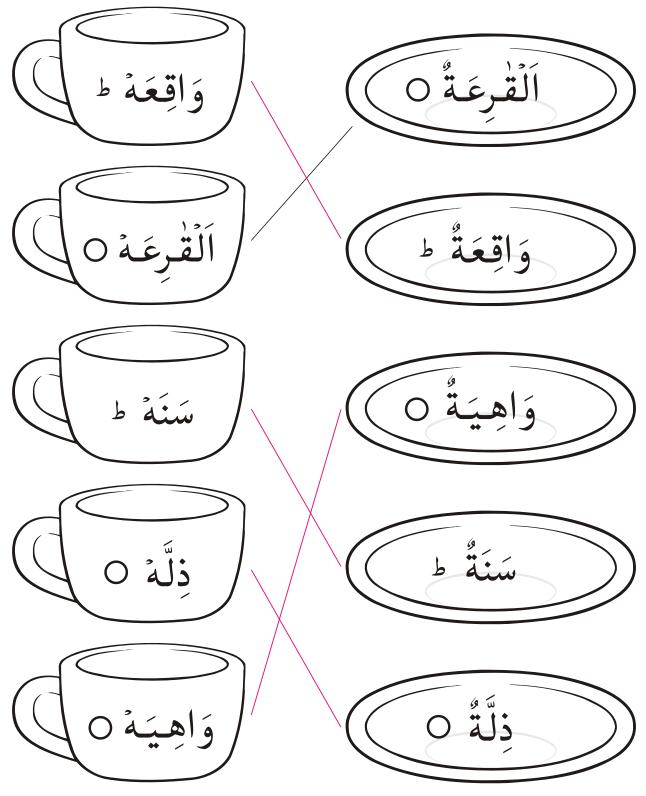
